ABOUT LINDSEY ADELMAN

Lindsey Adelman has long been obsessed with illumination in all its forms. A light sculptor, her work treads the porous border between sculpture and design. In 2006, with the goal of transforming the ephemeral nature of light into something not merely tangible but enduring, she launched Lindsey Adelman Studio with her very first product, the Branching Bubble chandelier. Since then, she has explored the visual tension between organic and industrial forms in a number of disciplines, introducing boundary-challenging designs from an innovative palette of materials. Combining hand-blown glass with the strong industrial beauty of machine-milled components, her lighting creates radiant warmth while underscoring the drama of shadows and emptiness. In addition to the lighting systems developed within her highly collaborative studio, she has carved out LaLAB as an experimental space to explore the concept of illumination on an unexplored plane in the shape of one-off, limited edition, or private commissions. A graduate of RISD, her work has been shown at The Cooper Hewitt Design Museum, The Future Perfect, and Nilufar Gallery.

ABOUT NANCY CALLAN

Nancy Callan grew up near Boston, MA, working as a pizza-maker, band roadie and graphic designer before attending the Massachusetts College of Art (BFA 1996). A chance peek into the hot glass studio changed the trajectory of her life; she was entranced by the fluid, glowing material and the demanding choreography of working at the furnace. In 1996 she relocated to Seattle, WA to join maestro Lino Tagliapietra's glassblowing team, rising to a key position as his assistant and traveling internationally to teach and demonstrate the craft. Through this nineteen-year apprenticeship, Callan mastered the traditional Venetian glassblowing techniques that are the foundation of her innovative work with line, pattern and color. Since then, Nancy Callan has blazed a trail as an LGBTQ woman, helping to inspire, teach and mentor the next generation of diverse artists in glass.

Nancy Callan is represented by galleries throughout North America and her work is in the collections of the Museum of Glass (WA), Microsoft Collection, Chrysler Museum (VA), The Mint Museum (NC), Peabody-Essex Museum (MA), Barry Museum (VA), Corning Museum of Glass (NY) and the Shanghai Museum of Glass (China). A major solo exhibition, "Nancy Callan: Forces At Play", opens at the Museum of Glass in Tacoma, Washington in October 2024.

ABOUT TIWA GALLERY

Celebrating the ever-evolving culture of craft, and the unexpectedness of the handmade, TIWA Gallery is a platform engaging with artists and makers who share an affinity for the handmade. Largely self-taught with the ability to work with locally-sourced materials, collaborators draw on traditional practices in their craft — but always as an embodied interpretation of their time, environment, and culture.
